# WASHINGTON STATE TRADITIONS



## THE COUGAR HEAD LOGO

In 1936, student Randall Johnson, class of 1938, designed the original Cougar head logo for Washington State College. It was used on the side of college trucks. In 1959, when the institution changed from college to university, he re-created the logo to incorporate the "U" in place of the "C." In 2002, WSU developed a new graphic identity. It employs the Cougar head within a crest, an internationally recognized symbol for higher education.

## THE COUGAR NICKNAME

Washington State University students officially adopted the nickname "Cougars" October 28, 1919, three days after a reference to "cougars" was used in a football game story following WSU's upset 14-0 win at California. In the story, a Bay Area writer said the Pacific Northwest team "played like cougars" in upsetting the Bears.



## THE VICTORY BELL

In the late 1800s, the victory bell was mounted on the ground in the center of campus; it rang to start and dismiss classes in those early days. Today, it is located at the Lewis Alumni Centre. A member of the Student Alumni Connection rings it after a WSU football win.



## THE COUGAR MASCOT

In 1927, Governor Roland Hartley presented a cougar cub to the students of the University. This first cougar mascot was called Butch, to honor Herbert "Butch" Meeker of Spokane, who was WSU's football star at the time. Butch II was presented to the students by Governor Clarence D. Martin in 1938. Butch III and IV were twin cubs, presented by Governor Arthur B. Langlie in 1942. Governor Langlie presented Butch V in 1955. Butch VI, the last live mascot on campus, died in the summer of 1978. He had been presented to WSU by Governor Albert Rosellini in 1964 from the Seattle Zoo. Today, WSU students in a "Butch the Cougar" mascot costume rally school spirit at athletic contests, including football games and other events.

# WASHINGTON STATE'S STUDENT RECREATION CENTER



The student recreation center opened spring of 2001. Its 150,000 square feet contains seven gymnasiums, a four-lane indoor track, 17,000 square feet of fitness training area, five-lane lap pool, leisure spa, three multi-purpose rooms (aerobic/martial arts), four racquetball courts, a wellness center, and a fireplace lounge.

Our Student-Athlete Development unit initiates support for academic and personal success during on-campus recruiting visits with prospective student-athletes, and continues providing support and services until student-athletes graduate from WSU. Our student-athlete development staff is committed to developing and implementing comprehensive and effective programs to assist student-athletes in identifying and meeting their academic and career goals leading to graduation and career development. We take a "life skills" approach when assisting student-athletes with class selection, major selection, graduation planning, career development, time management, goal setting, study skills, and learning strategies.

Our 92 percent graduation rate for those seniors who have exhausted their eligibility (over the past 10 years) reflects our consistent commitment to academic success while striking a balance between academics and athletics.

Cynthia Prieto enters her third year at Washington State University as the Academic Counselor for women's soccer eager to further her strong passion for both student development and athletics. Metzgar earned her bachelor's degree in exercise science in 1998 from Fort Lewis College where she was a member of the women's soccer team and the downhill ski racing team. She received her master's in physical education from Western Michigan in 2000 and served as a graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach. After earning her graduate degree, Metzgar spent a year as an intern strength and conditioning coach at Ohio State, assisting and supervising the training for ten sports including baseball, women's volleyball, women's swimming and men's and women's gymnastics.

## Yasushi Nomura Athletic Trainer

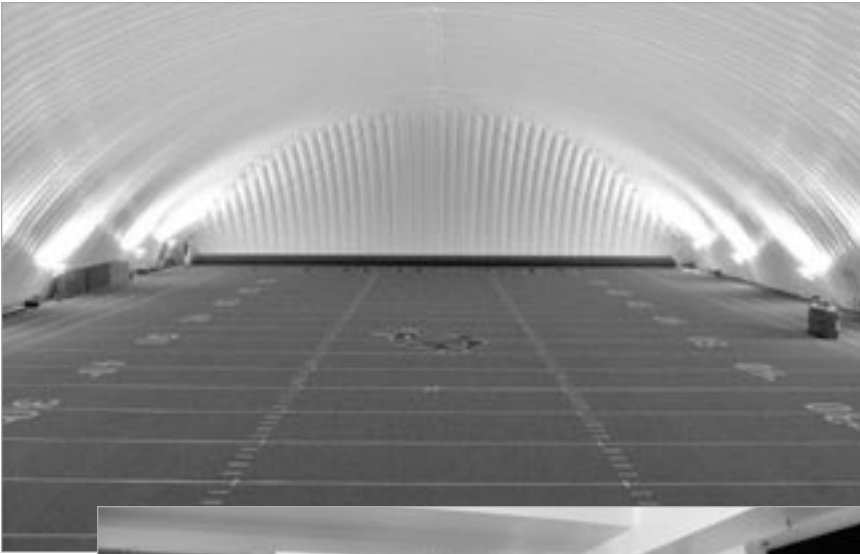

## V. LANE RAWLINS

### PRESIDENT



V. Lane Rawlins is Washington State University's ninth president. A labor economist, leads one of the nation's most productive research universities, classified with 96 of America's leading public and private universities with very high research activity by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

Under the guidance of a new strategic plan, that he initiated, student enrollment and admission standards are at an all time high. Research funding has also reached new levels, and WSU has experienced a substantial increase in the enrollment of high-ability students.

With Rawlins' leadership, the university's campuses in Pullman, Vancouver, Spokane and the Tri-Cities have evolved into a University system in which WSU's regional campuses

have greater flexibility to meet the needs of their communities. In the past five years, more than \$300 million in construction has taken place including major facilities for research in shock physics and biotechnology.

Rawlins has received recognition for his research, leadership and communication. He is a member of the Governor's Global Competitiveness Council and the Technology Alliance Board of Directors. Rawlins also serves as the Pac-10 representative to the NCAA.

Rawlins' association with WSU began in 1968, when he joined the faculty of the WSU Department of Economics. He published widely in major journals and co-authored books on labor economics and public policy. He chaired the department and, later, served as WSU vice provost. He then served as vice chancellor of the University of Alabama System and for nine years as president of The University of Memphis before returning to WSU.

Born in southeastern Idaho, Rawlins completed his bachelor's degree in economics at Brigham Young University in Utah and earned a doctoral degree in economics from the University of California Berkeley.

Rawlins and his wife Mary Jo have three children and 11 grandchildren.

## MARCIA SANEHOLTZ

### SENIOR ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS/SWA



Marcia Saneholtz has been an integral part of Cougar athletics for more than two decades, has been instrumental in the improvement of facilities since her appointment in 1982. She was the driving force in attaining the 1997 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championships, 2001 Women's Basketball West Regional and 2003 Men's Basketball First and Second Rounds for Washington State to host at the Spokane Arena. The success of these events led to subsequent opportunities to host premier NCAA events.

From March 6 until July 1, 2000, Saneholtz served as the interim Athletic Director at WSU. Saneholtz was named a WSU Woman of Distinction in 2003.

Originally from Napoleon, Ohio, Saneholtz received her bachelor's degree from Bowling Green State University

and taught in the Los Angeles public schools for three years. She moved north, taught in several Seattle-area school systems as a substitute and coached in the CYO and Seattle Parks Department programs. She was active as an official and administrator in the Washington, Northwest, and national officials associations from 1973-82.

After earning her master's degree in sports administration at the University of Washington, Saneholtz was appointed the assistant women's athletic director at Washington State.

Saneholtz was promoted to associate athletic director in 1982 and currently serves as a senior associate director of athletics and is the Senior Woman Administrator at WSU.

She served on the National Association of Collegiate Women's Athletic Administrators (NACWAA) Board of Directors from 1987-94, including a term as president in 1992-93. She was selected the NACWAA National Administrator of the Year in 1997.

Saneholtz has been a strong presence on several NCAA committees. She has served as the chair of the NCAA Women's Division I Volleyball Committee. Other NCAA memberships include the Committee on Athletic Certification (1993-99), chair of the Peer Selection Subcommittee (1992-99), President's Commission Liaison Committee (1992-96), the Women's Committee on Committees (1989-92) and the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics (2001-05). She has also served on numerous Pacific-10 Conference committees including two terms as vice president (1988-89 and 1998-99).

Saneholtz and her husband, Byron, have two grown daughters, Jennifer and Amy.

## JIM STERK

### DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



Washington native James M. Sterk was appointed Washington State University's director of athletics in June of 2000. In his six years, Sterk has seen unprecedented growth and success by the Cougars' 17 intercollegiate teams and 450 individuals who compete for WSU annually.

On the academic front, WSU earned 113 selections to Pacific-10 Conference All-Academic teams in 2004-05. That figure represented the most student-athletes to earn such an honor during an academic year in school history. WSU nearly reached this standard in 2005-06 with 109 selections to conference all-academic teams.

On the field, Cougar Athletics has enjoyed extraordinary achievements highlighted by three consecutive 10-win seasons by the football program from 2001-03. Most recently, 10

sports were represented either as a team or individually in NCAA postseason competition during the 2005-06 season. Featured in this group was the rowing team's fourth place finish at the NCAA Championships, the highest finish ever by a WSU women's team in NCAA postseason competition.

Facility improvements have also been among projects Sterk has tackled. Following the 2006 football season, the initial phases of a renovation to Martin Stadium, the home of Cougar football, will commence. WSU recently completed a major baseball field renovation, becoming the first collegiate field to feature FieldTurf as a playing surface. In addition, plans are underway for an ambitious capital improvement plan that will enhance many other WSU sport facilities.

A 1980 graduate of Western Washington University, Sterk received his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University. His professional career has included positions at North Carolina, Maine, Seattle Pacific, Tulane and Portland State, the latter as director of athletics for five years before joining the Cougar staff.

The foundation of Sterk's leadership plan is based on five areas: the student-athlete experience, resource acquisition, personnel, political dynamics, and facilities. All five areas have enjoyed growth in his first six years at Washington State University.

Sterk currently is a member of the prestigious NCAA Championship/Competition cabinet and has served on numerous Pacific-10 Conference committees during his tenure at WSU.

## KEN CASAVANT

### FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE



Professor Ken Casavant, a member of the Washington State University family since 1967, currently serves as WSU's Faculty Athletics Representative to the Pacific-10 Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association. He is a past president of the Pac-10 and was recently chosen to serve on the NCAA Division I Management Council.

Casavant came to WSU as a graduate research assistant in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics. He was named an assistant professor in 1971, an associate professor in 1975 and a full professor in 1980.

In 2004, Casavant received the honor of giving the Distinguished Faculty Address, the University's oldest award and also received the Sahlin Excellence in Public Service award for the University. In 1979, Casavant received the

R.M. Wade award for outstanding teacher in the college of agriculture at WSU, and in 1990, he earned the distinguished WSU Faculty of the Year award. Casavant was elected vice-chair (1991-92) and chair (1992-93) of the WSU Faculty Senate and has been accorded the Distinguished Teacher award by the American Agricultural Economics Association. He was named Distinguished Scholar by the Western Agricultural Economics Association in 2003 for his nationally recognized work as a transportation economist.

During his tenure at WSU, Casavant has served as associate director for the Washington State Transportation Center (1984-87) and the interim Vice-Provost for Academic Affairs and interim Vice-Provost for Research (1998).

The North Dakota native is a 1965 graduate of North Dakota State University, where he earned a bachelor's degree in agricultural economics. He received his master's degree from NDSU, followed by a Ph.D., from WSU in 1971.

Quam continues to build a successful women's swimming program as she enters her fifth season as head coach. The 2005-06 campaign saw junior All-American Erin McCleave finish 11th in the 1650 freestyle at the NCAA Championships and the Cougar squad defeat Oregon State in a dual meet for the first time in six seasons.

## MEN'S BASKETBALL



**Tony Bennett, 1st Year**  
Bennett enters his fourth year as a member of the Cougar coaching staff and his first as head coach. He was part of a staff that produced 36 overall and 18 conference wins, the best three-year span since 1996-98 and 1995-97, respectively. The Cougars led the Pac-10 in scoring defense each of the last two seasons.

Murrell enters her fifth season at the head of the Cougar women's basketball program. WSU continues to improve under Murrell's direction with the 2005-06 squad posting the best women's hoops record since 2000-01 and Kate Benz continuing to dominate the boards with her second consecutive Pac-10 rebounding title.

Since taking over the WSU program in 1998 Walt Williams' golf teams have re-written the Cougar record book and crowned two All-Americans. Both the men's and women's teams have qualified for the NCAA West Regionals, the women making five consecutive appearances plus one trip to the NCAA Championships.

The Cougars have been nationally-ranked each of the last three seasons. In 2005-06, the Cougars earned their first winning season since 2001 and posted 14 wins, their most since 1996. Under Hart's tutelage, sophomore Ekaterina Burdulji was selected to compete in the 2006 NCAA Individual Singles Championship.

## BASEBALL



**Don Marbut, 3rd Year**  
In two seasons as head coach, Marbut has turned Cougar fortunes around. In 2006 he led the Cougars to a 36-23 overall record, the greatest single-season win improvement in school history. Marbut's 57 victories are the most by any coach in Cougar baseball history during their first two years.

## ROWING



**Jane LaRiviere, 5th Year**  
The Cougars have earned three NCAA bids under LaRiviere. WSU finished second at the Pacific-10 Championships and fourth at the national championships in 2006, both best in program history. She earned Pacific-10 Conference and CRCA West Region Coach of the Year honors last season.

## TRACK & FIELD



**Rick Sloan, 13th Year**  
Sloan has coached Cougars for 33 years and has been named the USTCA West Region Coach of the Year five times. During his head coaching tenure, Sloan has directed 27 WSU athletes to NCAA Outdoor All-American status 46 times, and mentored 21 athletes to NCAA Indoor All-American status 33 times.

# Cougar Women's Athletics Show Strength in Conference and National Levels

The Washington State women's rowing team took fourth place at the NCAA Div. I Women's Rowing Championships, the highest national finish for any Cougar

women's team in school history. WSU's varsity eight boat finished fourth, the second varsity eight boat finished fifth, and the varsity four boat finished fourth at the national regatta. **Sarah Waterfield** became the first Cougar named to the Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association All-America first team while **Jody Thomas** was named to the CRCA All-America second team for the second consecutive year. Both were earlier named to the CRCA West Region First Team. In addition, Thomas collected first team All-Pac-10 honors in both 2006 and 2005, and Waterfield and Kasia Bloch were named to the 2006 All-Pac-10 first team. **Head Coach Jane LaRiviere** was named the Pac-10 Coach of the Year.



Diana Pickler

**Diana Pickler** set the school record in the heptathlon with her fifth-place finish at the USA Outdoor Track & Field Championships. Pickler scored 5,855 points, to better current Cougar assistant coach and former All-American Ellannee Richardson's 2003 heptathlon mark. Diana Pickler took third place in the heptathlon at the NCAA Outdoor Championships while her twin sister, Julie, took fifth place, earning both All-America honors. **Julie Pickler** finished second in the pentathlon at the NCAA Indoor Championships, earning All-America honors. **Tamara Diles** set the

school record in the pole vault with a leap of 13-feet, 11 1/4 inches (4.25m).

Cross Country runner **Haley Paul** became the third woman in WSU history to earn All-America honors in this sport with the 14th-place finish at the NCAA Div. I Women's Cross Country Championships. Paul also placed sixth at the Pac-10 Championships for all-conference honors.

On the links, golfer **Anastasia Kostina** earned a National Golf Coaches Association All-America honorable mention nod after being named to the first team the previous year. Kostina was also named to the All-Pac-10 team.

On the hardwood, **Kate Benz** continued making history by leading the Pac-10 in rebounding for the second consecutive year. Benz averaged 9.1 rebounds per game and 9.9 points per game as a junior. Her career rebound total of 696 ranks fourth all-time in school history. **Amanda DuRocher** was named to the Pac-10 All-Freshman team.

Cougar soccer keeper **Katie Hultin** captured the WSU school record for career shutouts with 21, including five last season, besting current assistant coach Lindsey Jorgensen's (1998-2001) career mark of 18. **Carmen Anderson** and Hultin were named All-Pac-10 second team and **Shaye Harrel** was named honorable mention.

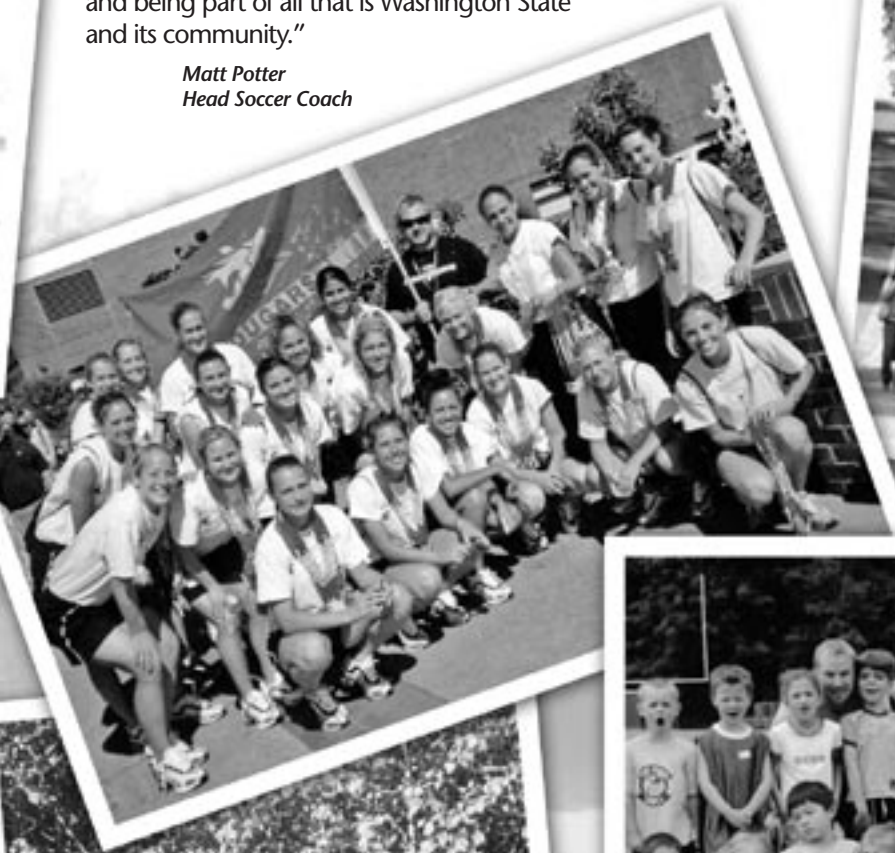

## HEAD COACH

Entering his fourth season at the helm of the Washington State women's soccer program, head coach Matt Potter continues to build a solid and competitive program as he looks to take Cougar soccer to the postseason.

Potter's 2005 Cougars won 11 games for just the sixth time in school history and finished the season with an overall record of 11-7-2, the best WSU finish since 2002. The Cougar defense also made its mark in 2005 blanking eight opponents for the most shutout decisions since 1994.

"The foundation of the past two seasons, the depth and talent of the squad and the dedication to developing the group since the end of last fall should make for an exciting 2006 season," Potter says. "We are clearly moving closer to our goal of being an elite women's program. To fulfill that aim, we need to consistently perform on the field and with that comes an individual accountability and willingness to

step forward when needed. We have focused on key aspects that will make the transition of the fall easier and will continue to prepare accordingly.

"We have an environment both on and off the field that we believe is second to none in terms of support, direction and commitment. Players and staff alike now have the responsibility to make the most of those resources and to develop and contribute as complete members of the team."

Potter is a USSAF "A" licensed coach and is currently the Region IV Olympic Development Program (ODP) head coach for the girls '88 age group and has been on the regional ODP staff since 1998. Potter earned the Preliminary and Teaching Awards from the English Football Association.

Before coming to WSU, Potter was the head of the Scottsdale Community

College women's soccer team. In just one season at Scottsdale, he led the Artichokes to a 9-7-1 record and to the 2002 ACCAC playoffs.

Potter spent eight years with the Sereno Soccer Club in Arizona where he served as a head coach and trainer. He led his '88 girls team to a Region IV regional second place finish, three third place finishes and four Arizona state titles. His '88 team was consistently ranked as one of the top 10 teams in the nation, and both his '88 team and '84 girls squad were ranked as top ten teams in Region IV over a five-year period. His '84 team took state seven years in a row. Nine of Potter's players made the Region IV regional team and three made the youth national team pool.

As a central midfielder, Potter competed at the top level of soccer, playing professionally for the Watford F.C. in England. He was a member of the West London squad that won the National British Colleges title in 1991 and played on the Great Britain Students squad, a team made of top college players. Potter also represented England at the U-19 International level. Potter also worked as a community director with the Brentford Football Club in London.

Befitting his educational background, Potter places much emphasis on academics and guides his players on how to excel in the classroom as well as on the playing field. After graduation from West London College in 1992 with an honors degree in physical education and religious, social and moral education, Potter took a position with Noga Soccer in New York and Arizona in 1993, coaching, establishing and developing a curriculum and coordinating clinics and camps.

Potter, a native of Mere, England, is married to Olga and has three stepdaughters, Marissa, Andrea, Valerie and a daughter, Cassidy.

Lindsey Jorgensen begins her fourth season as an assistant coach at Washington State. Jorgensen is a former Cougar keeper (1998-2001) who set several records and earned numerous accolades during her career. She brings extensive goalkeeping knowledge and the experience of being a WSU student-athlete to the program. Jorgensen assists with all coaching duties, but her primary focus is training and developing the goalkeeping unit.

"Lindsey continues to grow and blossom in the role of assistant coach. She is a wonderful person and is a key member of our soccer staff and team," Potter said. "As a former student athlete and honors college student she represents all that is good in Washington State and continues to pass on that knowledge to future and current athletes."

In 2003, Jorgensen was the Washington State women's soccer volunteer assistant; training goalkeepers and assisting with recruiting and office duties. She was the assistant varsity girls' soccer coach at Mount Si High School in 2002, and an assistant for the U-12 Eastside FC girls B-team out of Bellevue, Wash. Jorgensen has worked several soccer camps including serving as the director of the Seattle Sounders Girls Soccer Camp in 2003 and as a camp coach in 2000 and 2001. She was the goalkeeper director for the Washington State University Women's Soccer Camp from 2000-2005.

Jorgensen was the starting goalkeeper for Washington State from 1998-2001, and a captain of the 2000 NCAA tournament team. She holds the WSU all-time career records in saves (392) and minutes in goal (6,461). She tops the single-season saves list (126 in 1999) and is tied for third in single-season goal against average (.89 in 2000).

Jorgensen earned numerous accolades while at Washington State including; Verizon/CoSIDA District VIII Women's Fall/Winter At-Large First Team All-American (2000), Verizon/CoSIDA At-Large Women's Fall/Winter National Third Team All-Academic (1999, 2000), WSU Athletics Top 50 Student Athlete Award (2000, 2001), Pac-10 All-Academic First Team (1999, 2000), Pac-10 All-Conference Second Team (2000, 2001). Jorgensen was also well-respected by her teammates, earning the team awards of; co-MVP (1998-2000), Team captain (1999-2001) and most inspirational player (2000).

Jorgensen was a member of the founding Seattle Sounders (W-league) women's soccer team (1999-2002). She also played for the Hibernian and Caldonian Saints (Seattle, Wash.) from 2000-2002 and was invited to tryout for the San Jose Cyberrays of the WUSA in 2002.

Jorgensen graduated with a BS in math education in December of 2002 and is currently pursuing her master's degree in secondary education at WSU. She had great experiences student-teaching/coaching at the high-school level but enjoys the challenges and rewards of coaching at the collegiate level.

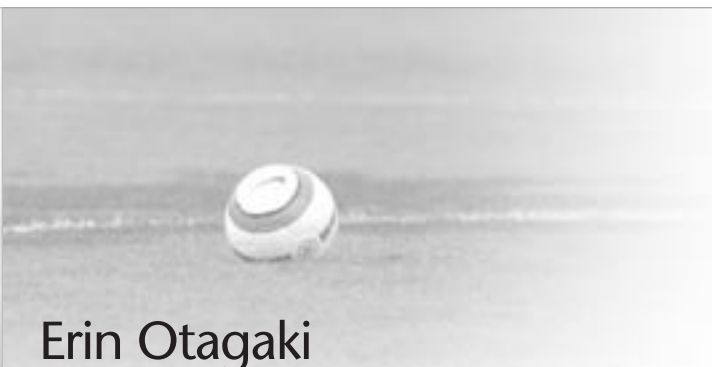

## ASSISTANT COACH

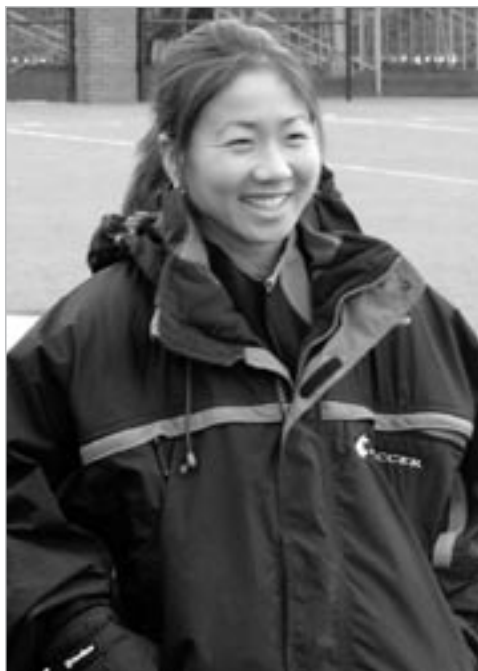
Erin Otagaki enters her first season as an assistant coach with the Washington State women's soccer program.

Otagaki, a former Washington player and coach, returns to the Pacific Northwest after a two-year stint at Purdue where she served as an assistant under head coach Rob Klatte. Otagaki saw the 2005 Boilermakers finish second in the Big Ten Conference play and make their first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since 2002.

Prior to her tenure at Purdue, Otagaki spent six years at Washington as a player and volunteer coach. In her four seasons as a Husky player, Otagaki competed in three NCAA tournaments and was a member of the 2000 Pacific-10 championship team. She was a two-time PAC-10 All-Academic honorable mention honoree, was named UW's 2001 Soccer Scholar Athlete, and earned her bachelor's degree in English in December 2001.

After graduation, Otagaki spent two seasons in Seattle as a volunteer assistant coach, assisting in practices and recruiting efforts while pursuing a master's degree in secondary education which she completed

Last summer, Otagaki continued her coaching education as an ODP Region II CIT and has already received her NSCAA Regional Diploma, a NSCAA goalkeeping license and is a USSF 'C' licensed coach.

A graduate of Punahou High School in Honolulu, Otagaki twice helped her prep squad place third at the Hawaii state championships (1994, 1997). She participated in the ODP regional pool from 1995-96.





Entering the 2006-07 season, the Pacific-10 Conference continues to uphold its tradition as the "Conference of Champions."® Pac-10 members have claimed an incredible 138 NCAA team titles over the past 16 seasons, for an average of more than eight championships per academic year.

Even more impressive is the breadth of the Pac-10's success, as those 138 team titles have come in 24 different men's and women's sports. The Pac-10 has led the nation in NCAA Championships 40 of the last 46 years and finished second five times.

Spanning nearly a century of outstanding athletics achievement, the Pac-10 has captured 351 NCAA titles (251 men's, 100 women's), far outdistancing the runner-up Big Ten Conference's 205 titles.

The Conference's reputation is further proven in the annual United States Sports Academy Directors' Cup competition, the prestigious award that honors the best overall collegiate athletics programs in the country. STANFORD continued its remarkable run in the 2005-06 season, winning its 12th consecutive Directors' Cup. In the 2005-06 competition, seven of the Top-25 Division I programs were Pac-10 members: No. 1 STANFORD, No. 2 UCLA, No. 6 CALIFORNIA, No. 9 USC, No. 10 ARIZONA, No. 13 ARIZONA STATE and No. 17 WASHINGTON. The Pac-10 landed six programs in the Top-15, three more than the second-place SEC (3).

The Pac-10 captured nine NCAA titles in 2005-06 to lead the nation. It should be noted that the Pac-10 total does not include CALIFORNIA's national championship in rugby or men's crew, as they are not counted as NCAA titles. The Pac-10 led the nation with the most NCAA titles in women's sports with six.

NCAA team champions from the Pac-10 in 2005-06 came from UCLA (men's volleyball and women's water polo), STANFORD (women's cross country and women's tennis), ARIZONA (softball), CALIFORNIA (women's rowing), USC (men's water polo), WASHINGTON (women's volleyball) and OREGON STATE (baseball). The Pac-10 also had runners-up in six NCAA Championship events: men's basketball (UCLA), women's soccer (UCLA), women's golf (USC), women's outdoor track and field (USC), men's swimming and diving (ARIZONA) and women's indoor track and field (STANFORD). The Trojans also competed in the BCS National Championship Game, but football is not recognized as an NCAA title. Overall, the Conference had 15 teams finish in the top three at NCAA Championship events.

Participation in the postseason was a common occurrence for the Conference in 2005-06. Of the 22 sports sponsored by the Pac-10, 18 witnessed at least half its teams participating in NCAA or other postseason action. The men sent 56 of a possible 92 teams into the postseason (60.8 percent), while the women sent 61 of a possible 100 teams (61.0 percent).

On the women's side, the story is much the same. Since the NCAA began conducting women's championships 25 years ago, Pac-10 members have claimed at least four national titles in a single season on 17 occasions. Overall, the Pac-10 has captured 100 NCAA women's crowns, easily outdistancing the Southeastern Conference, which is second with 66. Pac-10 members have dominated a number of sports, winning 18 softball titles, 17 tennis crowns, 11 of the last 16 volleyball titles, 11 of the last 17 trophies in golf and eight in swimming and diving.

Pac-10 women athletes shine nationally on an individual basis as well, having captured an unmatched 464 NCAA individual titles, an average of more than 18 champions per season.

### WSU POSTS BEST OVERALL RECORD SINCE 2002

The 2005 Washington State women's soccer squad won 11 games for just the sixth time in school history and finished the season with an overall record of 11-7-2, the best WSU record since 2002. The 2005 campaign also marks head coach Matt Potter's best finish at the helm of the Cougar soccer program.



### COUGARS EARN ALL-TOURNAMENT HONORS

Washington State sophomore Allison Scurich earned Defensive MVP honors at the OSU Nike Invitational Tournament while seniors Alix Rustrum, Carmen Anderson and Ashley Lara were named to the all-tournament team. Scurich and Lara led a Cougar defense that shutout both Virginia Commonwealth and Long Island in tournament play and held its opponents to a combined 11 shots. Scurich also provided an assist on Rustrum's game winning goal against LIU. Rustrum led the

Cougar offense with eight shots in the two contests with Anderson adding four as Washington State out shot its opponents 25-to-11. Rustrum found the back of the net against Long Island recording her first tally of the season.



### DEFENSE TALLYS MOST SHUTOUTS SINCE 1994

The Cougar defense made its mark in 2005, blanking eight opponents for the most shutouts in a season since 1994. WSU recorded shutout victories against Idaho, Virginia Commonwealth, Long Island, San Francisco, Oregon State, Oregon and Washington, while battling No. 4 UCLA to a 0-0 tie. The 2005 tally marks just the third time in school history the women's soccer squad has posted eight or more shutouts with the 1994 team racking-up 10 and 1991 squad notching eight. Cougar keeper

Katie Hultin was responsible for seven of the 2005 shutouts, tying her for third on the single season shutout list in the Cougar record books.

### COUGARS SHINE IN OVERTIME

Washington State faced extra minutes in six contests in 2005, earning a record of 4-0-2 in overtime games. The Cougars overtime success was highlighted by the 3-2 upset of No. 20 Tennessee and the 2-1 double-overtime victory over No. 19 Arizona. WSU also recorded overtime wins against Idaho and Oregon. The Cougars battled two ranked opponents through double-overtime games, recording ties against No. 20 Cal Poly (1-1) and No. 4 UCLA (0-0).



### ANDERSON EARNS NATIONAL, CONFERENCE POSTSEASON HONORS

Washington State senior Carmen Anderson was named to the 2005 West Region third team by *Soccer Buzz Magazine*. Anderson added the honor to her postseason accolades after also being named to the Pacific-10 All-Conference second team. Anderson led the Cougars in 2005 with seven goals, four assists and 16 points. The Kennewick, Wash., native netted two game-winners during the season and recorded her first

multiple-goal match with a two-goal performance in the Cougars' 2-1 win over No. 19 Arizona. The 2005 co-captain is a three-time Pac-10 All-Academic honorable mention honoree and finished her WSU career with 10 goals, four assists and 24 points in 40 starts in the Cougar midfield and defense.



### HULTIN LEAVES MARK ON COUGAR RECORD BOOKS

Senior keeper Katie Hultin posted a 10-7-2 overall record in 2005, recording seven solo shutouts and earning All-Pac-10 second team honors for the second consecutive year. Hultin's 2005 performance ranks her second in shutouts (7) and tied for third in wins (10) in the Cougar single season record books. The co-captain boasted a .792 saves percentage making 84 stops in 2005. The Denver, Colo., native owns the top spot on the Cougar career shutout list with 21 and ranks second in saves (248),

third in wins (23) and fourth in goals against average (1.03). Hultin finished her WSU career 23-22-6 overall with 52 starts in the Cougar net. Hultin was also a three-time Pac-10 All-Academic honorable mention honoree and was named to the 2004 CoSIDA Academic All-District VIII (8) team.

## COUGAR SOCCER EARNS NATIONAL, WSU ACADEMIC AWARDS

Washington State soccer was recognized for academic excellence, earning a 2004-05 NSCAA/adidas Women's Collegiate Team Academic Award and the Washington State Athletic Department's Glenn Kranc Academic Award for the 2005 fall semester.

The Cougars carried a 3.51 team grade point average during the 2004-05 academic year to garner the NSCAA/adidas award. The team GPA ranked them among the top-20 schools nationally and was the highest GPA of the Pacific-10 Conference.

Washington State continued to shine in the classroom posting a program-high 3.55 team GPA during the 2005 fall semester to earn WSU's Kranc Academic Award.

## COUGARS LAND TWELVE ON PAC-10 ALL-ACADEMIC LISTS

Twelve members of the Cougar soccer squad earned Pacific-10 Conference All-Academic recognition in 2005. Senior Ashley Lara earned first team honors for the second consecutive year while seniors Katie Hultin, Jennie Kunc and Alix Rustrum were named to the second team. Eight Cougars also earned honorable mention honors.

## SEVEN NAMED USAA TOP 50 ALL-AMERICAN SCHOLAR ATHLETES

Seven Cougars were named USAA (United State Achievement Academy) Top 50 All-American Scholar Athletes for 2005-06. Seniors Alix Rustrum and Ashley Lara, along with sophomores Brooke Bemis, Brynn Bemis, Natalie Elkind, Shaye Harrel and Anna Miller earned the honors.

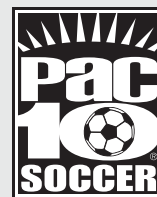

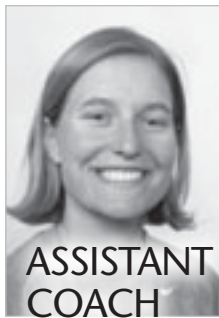
